letter returned to me from the address there, to where it had been forwarded, and I was beginning to despair of ever hearing from you again.

The magazine is indeed interesting, as you know it embraces the subject upon which my mind is bent.

My brother Jack (J. F. Falda) has just painted a picture entitled "They Spared Her Life" and it is published in color by The Globe Fine Art Publishing Co., 185 Fleet Street, London.

I would like you to see it. He is a very clever artist, I

would like you to meet him. I know he and his wife are both interested in your teachings.

If you see Mrs. Russell, will you give him my kind regards and tell him I often think of the enjoyable reception and his hospitality.

I wish I could be in France now and help with my wife's strength to obliterate or wear the scarring of the dreadful "Hun". What a terrible nightmare there will be when the war is over. I am going to try to visit France again in the near future - if possible, the cowardly strategists of the Germans with their Jappelen and swines, best we
